

Ibiza, Menorca, Mallorca, part of **Spain**, are known as party destinations in world. Beautiful **beaches**, restaurants, parties at open, or beach parties are just samples what Balearic Islands offer. You will need to take a rest from night life and your yacht is the best way to escape and forget last night while on anchor or on sand beach with glass of white wine and book, or maybe on jet ski, banana. In **Menorca** life is a stark contrast to the wild party scene that dominates Ibiza and the shopping mania that consumes Majorca. Though it caters well for the burgeoning tourist industry, the 'jewel of the **Balearics**' has retained much of its virgin landscape and traditional **Spanish** heritage and is more suited to a laid back, nature-loving crowd or family groups than the young and restless party lovers that flock to neighbouring islands. For the younger generation, **Ibiza** is somewhere to escape the dreary reality of working life back home and experience an atmosphere of **Balearic Beats** that is hard to find elsewhere. Host to some of the most impressive club nights in the world, when high season arrives the **island** is swarming with thousands seeking, not only a perfect tan, but the holiday experience of a lifetime. The dramatic **coastline** of **Majorca** presents **holidaymakers** with a myriad of choices of beach resort, while the mountains offer an altogether different holiday experience in picturesque hilltop villages amid lush landscapes; the mountain villages of **Valldemossa, Deià** and **Soller** have outstanding settings and lots of character.

Most **tourists** come to **Majorca** for the beach and nightlife and Magaluf in the south is the undisputed king, with its wide, sweeping bay loaded with beach activities and backed by numerous cafés and restaurants. Nightlife here is frenetic and consists of hundreds of bars and nightclubs, while the northern resort of **Alcudia** is quieter and more family orientated

Formentera is the smallest of the **Balearic Islands**, is located just off the coast of Ibiza and boasts a length of only 12 miles from tip to tip. It is often referred to as the 'last paradise of the **Mediterranean**' due to its lack of urban development and limit on the number of resorts that are allowed to be built. The island is dominated by stunning beaches of pure white **sand** that lead down to the clear turquoise waters of the **Mediterranean**. Many **beaches** are deserted and it is possible to spend a whole day lazing on a **beach** and never lay eyes on another soul. Its deserted character has made the island popular among nudists, with nude bathing being tolerated on most **beaches**.

Sample Itinerary: Denia to Cala Purroig (Ibiza)

Spend the first evening getting used to the yacht. At around 10pm, you will start the crossing from Denia to Purroig. After about 50 nautical miles from Denia, cap 90°, you'll reach Ibiza and heading south east, you'll reach Purroig Creek. Denia - Cala Purroig - Illetes - Puerto de la Sabina : A little rest at Purroig, enjoy lunch on board while navigating towards Formentera. 10 nautical miles further, you'll anchor at Illetes, where you'll spend the evening and then finally drop anchor in the Port de la Sabina.

La Sabina - Cala Saona - Espalmador : A day spent navigating towards moorings in exceedingly transparent waters (Cala Saona) where you can swim, eat and disembark... In the evening, you'll set sail for Espalmador, an uninhabited island where you'll drop anchor for the night facing a sandy beach protected by dunes.

Espalmador - Puerto de Ibiza : After breakfast, tour the island, frolic in the waters and return to the boat for lunch. You'll then set sail for the port of Ibiza. Touring the town is recommended for checking out its extravagant night life. If you like partying, set yourself limits because Ibiza doesn't have any.

Puerto de Ibiza - Cala Portinatx : After getting up, taking your time, set sail along the east coast of Ibiza and stop for lunch facing the the Island of Togamago. In the evening, navigate towards the Creek of Portinatx, where you will drop anchor if there's not a northerly wind.

Cala Portinatx - San Antonio : During the day, sail towards the north of Ibiza. Have lunch in one of the numerous creeks which you'll come across along the way (Benirras, Salada...) In the evening, set sail for San Antonio and prepare for the journey back to Denia.

San Antonio - Denia : Set sail early since the boat must be returned before 6pm. Some people prefer navigating during the evening in direction of Denia and spending the last day in one of the Creeks of Javea. Not a bad option.

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
